Dear Sirs:

I am in receipt of your email of January 6, 2011, which notes that my book "has shown no sales for longer than a year," and offering to return my book's rights to me in return for payment of \$149.00. This email appears to be identical to an email you sent me on January 5, 2011. My response is the same, as follows:

As I'm sure you will recall, in 2007, shortly after I signed our contract, I informed you that I would not be purchasing any copies of my own book. I also stated that if your business model was to sell books to me, rather than to the general public, then it was my belief that you had defrauded me and that we should terminate the contract immediately to save you the time and expense of proceeding further with my book. Your response was to insist that you are a legitimate company, and you threatened legal action if I did not fully comply with our contract.

I think we both now know that you never had any intention of marketing my book to the general public, and that your plan all along was primarily to sell copies of my book to me. I consider PublishAmerica to be nothing more than a dishonest and deceitful vanity press. Therefore, I have no intention of paying you \$149.00, or any other amount of money.

However, **I fully expect you to comply with our contract by continuing to send me semi-annual statements regarding my book sales and any royalty payments due.** Of course, if you would like to terminate our contract and avoid those obligations in the future, I would be agreeable to that. But you will not get any of my money—ever.
